Muskoka Winter Festivals

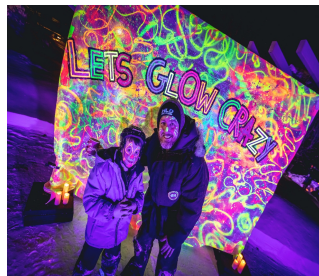

Kearney Dog Sled Races

An unforgettable weekend of family fun and winter spirit as the dogs take over the streets of Kearney. Please leave your pets at home and avoid petting the race dogs but visit the “Pet-a-Pup Pitstop” at the entrance to the vendors market. They want every spectator, musher, and furry friend to have the most positive experience possible.

The races drawing teams and mushers from Alaska, Quebec, Manitoba, Ontario and the North Eastern and Central States. Kearney hosts more than 70 competitive mushers along with novice and future mushers. This tradition has been running annually since 1994.

Five race classes of different distances for the professional or beginner musher trek through the beautiful northern wilderness. The *I-Kid-Arod* race for mini-mushers aged 5 - 12 years always gets great response from the crowd as they cheer on the participants.



Outdoor Activities

Races begin at 9:00 a.m. at the main staging area across from the Legion and run through the forested area around Kearney. Between races there is lots to enjoy.

The Scavenger Hunt

Pick up your first clue at the souvenir's table and head off throughout the racing grounds to learn more about sled dog sports, mushing, and the history of the race. Have fun while you explore the dog yard.

Market Place Vendors

Various vendors will be on the back patio of the Legion, selling items ranging from apparel, jewelry, pet products, souvenirs, and more. Come and visit them at their tents, then warm up by the bonfire.

Dog Sled Rides (Adults \$25, Children \$20)

A great family activity, provided by Abitibi Sled Dogs, on a first come first serve basis, between 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. both race days.

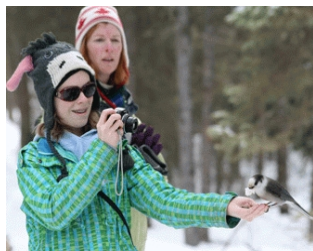

Snowshoeing at Sandhill is about wandering and discovery. Guests are welcome to explore the grounds freely in snowshoes, and to walk the Forest of Light path during off hours, taking in the scenery from a new perspective.

Cross-country designated paths offers a gentle way to move through the landscape. It's perfect for a peaceful glide, a bit of fresh air, and taking in the quiet beauty of winter.

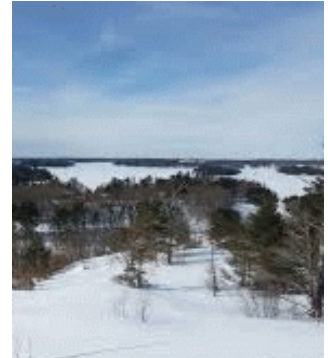

Natural Winter Wonders



Ragged Falls is always a remarkable destination near Algonquin Park, and it's even more enchanting in winter. As the Oxtongue River slows down, the falls partially freeze transforming them into a dreamy wonderland of dramatic ice structures. Picture jagged icicles glistening in the sun and a blanket of snow making everything look like a postcard. Snowshoe or hike the short trail to the falls for a view that captures Muskoka's wild, rugged beauty at its best.

Limberlost Forest & Wildlife Reserve transforms into a serene, snowy wonderland. Twenty private lakes freeze over, creating beautiful, silent landscapes with sites like Buck Lake, Clear Lake and Hickory Lake offering stunning winter scenes. The pristine environment is excellent for finding animal tracks in the snow, with opportunities to see deer, porcupines, and other forest creatures. The vast mixed forest, with snow dusting branches and quiet trails, offers a true escape, making it ideal for peaceful exploration amidst natural beauty.

Huckleberry Rock Lookout just outside of Port Carling is known for its panoramic views of Lake Muskoka, and winter only enhances the magic. Though it's a bit of a climb, the reward is a sweeping view of Muskoka blanketed in snow. To make the climb easier, to one of the highest points in the area, bring your snowshoes. Huckleberry Rock Lookout is particularly beautiful at sunset where you can gaze over forests, frozen lakes, and rolling snow-covered hills.

Hardy Lake where icy cascades and frosty pathways create a picture-perfect escape in Muskoka. Hardy Lake Provincial Park, near Torrance, is a favourite among locals and visitors alike, and its trails are stunning year-round. In winter, the park's lake and rocky outcrops turn into a winter wonderland. The rugged trail loops around Hardy Lake, offering several lookouts. Bring snowshoes or ice cleats to make the winter adventure that much easier.

Torrance Barrens Dark Sky Preserve, just west of Gravenhurst, is the world's first permanent Dark Sky Preserve and is world renowned for its astronomical value. The vast expanses of Canadian Shield bedrock provide an unobstructed surface from which to observe the sky, offering a 360° panoramic view of the cosmos. Few places in the world offer such an accessible opportunity for spectacular stargazing and aurora viewing. The winter months are prime times to view the Northern Lights due to darker skies and cold, clear weather.

Ontario 55+ Winter Games

A Winter Sports Spectacular, over 1,000 dynamic athletes from across Ontario will converge on picturesque Huntsville to compete in 11 thrilling winter sports and 3* demonstration sports. Competitions will take place at 15 carefully selected venues throughout Huntsville and the surrounding area, from Sundridge to Gravenhurst, ensuring athletes compete in top-quality facilities. These accomplished seniors will inspire spectators and fellow participants alike with their dedication, skill, and sportsmanship.

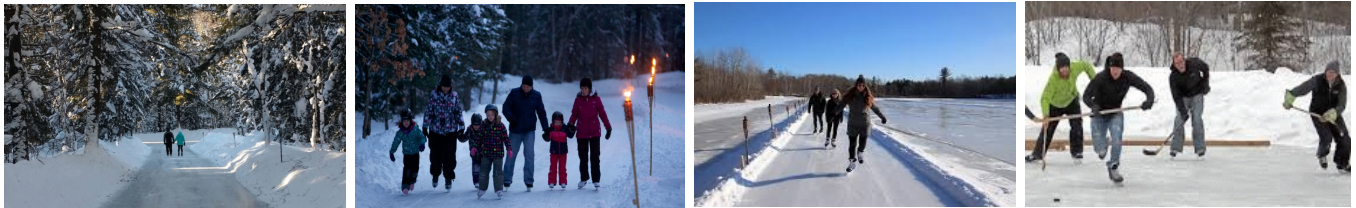

Muskoka Winter Sports

Muskoka doesn't hibernate it transforms into a winter sports haven with activities like ice skating on forest trails, extensive snowshoeing and cross-country skiing, downhill skiing and snowboarding, snowmobiling across vast groomed trails, traditional ice fishing and the newer fat biking, all offering a diverse, picturesque Canadian winter experience for all ages and skill levels, with rentals available at many locations. All winter activities are weather dependent.

Ice Skating Trails

Check out two amazing skating trails, both with their own unique twist to this age-old Canadian pastime or try the quainter local trails at Dwight Beach, Memorial Park in Bracebridge and the 200m trail at Hanna Park in Port Carling.



Arrowhead Ice Skating Trail

This magical fairy tale skate through the Canadian forest, was named one of the world's most stunning natural rinks by Travel + Leisure. The 1.3 km ice skating trail winds through the thick Muskoka forest and is a winter experience like no other. If you get to skate the loop after a fluffy snowfall, consider yourself in luck. Being surrounded on all sides by snow-covered evergreen trees is an absolutely stunning sight, and one that you won't soon forget.

Cranberry Ice Trail

Muskoka Lakes Farm & Winery, Bala

Skate a 1.2 km loop around 12 acres of cranberries. With forest on one side and cranberry beds on the other, this is a one-of-a-kind experience. Head back to the winery for hot mulled wine or hot cran-apple cider. Every Saturday night, they light the trail with 400 tiki torches for Light the Night skating. There is also an acre of bog hockey skating on frozen cranberries, which can be set up as 4 pond hockey surfaces.

Outdoor Skating Rinks

Cedar Canoe Book's Ice Rink at River Mill Park in downtown Huntsville transforms winter into a magical playground for families and visitors alike. The unmonitored rink is open daily, and becomes an enchanted outdoor venue each evening as a sparkling canopy of lights illuminates the ice until 9 pm. (see Winter Festivals)

Lions Lookout is a beautiful, large outdoor rink in Huntsville behind the Canada Summit Centre.

Dwight Outdoor Rink is open seasonally with lighting for evening use.

Dorset Ice Palace outdoor rink is maintained by the Township of Algonquin Highlands.

Baysville Outdoor Rink is located near the Baysville dam.

Annie Williams Park in Bracebridge, has two areas, one for purely skating, the other for hockey.

Wharf Sports Field Gravenhurst, has two outdoor ice surfaces and Boston Pizza has a rink just outside its patio, open to the public.

Clear Lake Brewing Torrance, this is a labour of love built and maintained by staff, friends and neighbours. It is open to everyone, for use during brewery hours (9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.)

Cross-Country Skiing and Snowshoeing

Winter in Muskoka is a season like no other, where forests, lakes, and waterfalls transform into breathtaking landscapes of snow and ice. As temperatures drop, Muskoka's trails become peaceful, powdery paths, and waterfalls freeze into sparkling cascades of ice. These natural wonders offer unforgettable adventures for snowshoers, hikers, and cross-country skiers alike.



Top Spots for All Levels

Arrowhead Provincial Park Huntsville, is the premier destination with over 30km of groomed ski trails (classic & skate) and marked snowshoe trails, plus rentals and off-trail options.

Limberlost Forest & Wildlife Reserve Hillside, offers over 70km of complimentary trails for all abilities, with stunning views from loops like Buck Lake.

Muskoka Lakes Farm & Winery Bala, has 10km of picturesque snowshoe trails winding through vineyards, with a mix of easy and advanced options.

Scenic & Nature Focussed

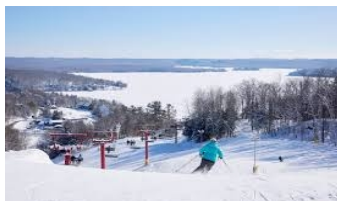
Frost Centre Dorset, is known for wildlife tracking with 22km of trails, including scenic loops around St. Nora Lake, great for observing animal tracks.

Hardy Lake Provincial Park Muskoka Lakes, offers rugged, beautiful loops around the lake with great lookouts, requiring snowshoes or cleats.

Bracebridge Resource Management Centre, a local favourite with 16.5km of groomed, track-set trails for skiing and snowshoeing.

Downhill Skiing and Snowboarding

Hidden Valley Highlands Ski Area Huntsville, is Muskoka's one and only ski hill ideal for downhill skiers of all levels with eleven runs, 3 lifts and a dedicated beginner area. It's challenging enough for an avid skier or snowboarder, while still being a great place for those who are new to the sport. There's a terrain park, kids camps, childcare, as well as ski & snowboard instruction and rentals. Ski & Stay packages are available from Deerhurst Resort and Hidden Valley Resort, both right next door to the ski hill. Book an overnight package with lift tickets included. The hill typically opens mid-December until March Break. Sundays & Mondays 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Closed Tuesdays & Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays & Saturdays 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Snowmobiling (Riders need an OFSC permit)

Hundreds of kilometres of marked, groomed trails connect the region, perfect for exploring snowy landscapes and enjoying the horsepower. Gas up your sled and ride along Muskoka's renowned snowmobile trails this winter. With some of Ontario's most unbelievable scenery and over 1,000 kms of groomed snowmobile trails that link the northern and southern parts of the province, you won't regret the decision to hop on!



The Lake Muskoka Magic Tour, a leisurely day ride (approximately 125 km) around glorious Lake Muskoka. Start your tour at the Muskoka Wharf in Gravenhurst. This incredibly scenic loop takes you through Torrance, Bala, Port Carling, Bracebridge, and Gravenhurst, with services easily accessible throughout these communities. Don't miss the opportunity to take the small excursion to Huckleberry Rock Lookout and take in one of Muskoka's most famous views.

The Lake of Bays Watch Tour let's you explore a different part of Muskoka and makes a satisfying day ride (approximately 200 km) through Lake of Bays and the Huntsville area. Tour highlights include impressive ice cliffs, the historic Big East River Bridge, the beautiful Oxtongue Rapids and the stirring Dyer Memorial. This scenic loop takes you through Baysville and Dorset, and close to Huntsville and Dwight.

The Round Algonquin Park (RAP) Tour if you've got the time and are really looking for adventure, you won't want to miss out. Known as the granddaddy of all snowmobile tours, this 850 km loop of Ontario's world-famous Algonquin Park appears on the bucket list of most sledders, and for good reason. By far the most popular loop in Ontario, many return year after year to get their fix. Sleddable in three to five days, depending on how hard you want to ride, the tour takes you through a varied range of Muskoka's signature terrain, from winding trails through thick maple forests to wide open straightaway corridors and rolling hills. Sledders will find themselves welcomed by the many local businesses, restaurants, gas stations, and providers of accommodations along the way. If you spend the first and last night of your trip at one of Muskoka's welcoming resorts, you will be more than welcome to leave your sled trailer parked on their premises for the duration of your trip.



Muskoka Winter Sports – Continued

Ice Fishing

Enjoy the classic Canadian winter activity with resorts offering huts, gear, and guides. Muskoka is home to many fish species including lake trout, smallmouth bass, whitefish, pickerel and perch in its frozen lakes.



Muskoka Shores Cottages on Three Mile Lake, Muskoka Lakes, has ice huts available for daily rentals, as well as an overnight ice fishing package complete with cottage accommodation and ice hut rental.

Bondi Cottage Resort on Lake of Bays. Enjoy the open-air or fish in your own pop-up hut when conditions permit. They also have two four-person ice huts with propane heaters, which are subject to availability in the winter.

Fat Biking

Explore snowy Muskoka trails on two extra-wide wheels, Fat biking is one of the greatest winter activities you can get into, and it is so simple to do. No other winter activity has grown in popularity as much as fat biking in recent years. Liv Outside in Bracebridge has rentals and trails on-site, and Algonquin Outfitters in Huntsville has bikes for rent with trails nearby.



Curling



For over 125 years Curling has been one of the best winter activities available in Muskoka. If you've never played before, don't fret many clubs offer beginner programs that teaches you the fundamentals of curling in a fun and engaging way, with equipment provided. The goal is to transition you into one or more of the club leagues, should you wish to continue on, range from competitive to purely social and fun leagues. Expect a friendly atmosphere with events, bonspiels, and clubhouses for relaxing. Muskoka Curling Clubs include Huntsville, Port Carling, South Muskoka (Bracebridge), Bala, and Baysville.
